2023 Washington STEM Legislative Priorities

- Early Learning System Improvements: Support the equitable implementation of the Fair Start for Kids Act through improvements to agency measurement and transparency. Support community efforts for increased investments to develop the early childcare workforce. (PASSED AND FUNDED)
- Applying Dual Credit: Increase equitable completion and application of dual credit by bridging the gaps between K-12 and higher education systems. (PASSED AND FUNDED)
- ☐ High School to Postsecondary: Improve the utility of postsecondary- and career-readiness strategies and tools through evidence and community voice. (PASSED AND FUNDED)

EARLY LEARNING LEGISLATION

- Early Learning Data Visualization Proviso
 - ▶ \$300k FY 23-25. Senate Sponsor: Sen. Claire Wilson (30th LD) House Sponsor: Rep. Chipalo Street (37th LD)
 - Result: FUNDED in the BUDGET. Funds will go to DCYF
- ► SB 5225: Increasing access to the working connections childcare program. (Sen. Claire Wilson. 30th LD)
 - The bill increases access by modifying the income threshold and requirements expanding WCCC for more families, undocumented families, child care providers and families in the therapeutic court system.

- SB 5048: Eliminating College in the High School Fees (Sen. Mark Mullet, 5th LD)
 - The bill eliminates all fees, funding \$300 per student up to per course maximums.
- ► HB 1316: Expanding access to dual credit programs (Rep. Dave Paul, 10th LD)
 - ▶ The bill expands a successful Summer Running Start Pilot program to be statewide.

CAREER PATHWAYS LEGISLATION

- ► SB 5243: Concerning High School and Beyond Planning (Sen. Lisa Wellman, 41st LD)
 - The bill provides guidance to have a statewide platform for the HSBP
 - HSBP is a tool students begin in middle school with a career and interest survey and is designed to guide students in their course taking, extracurriculars, and postsecondary pursuits aligned with their individualized career goals and interests.
 - Implementation varies bright spots and not so bright spots.
 - Washington STEM Provided language to partner with existing community and regional networks.

Investments Across Washington:

SBCTC CTE Dual Credit Pilot:

\$700K for a pilot program to increase career and technical education dual credit participation and credential attainment in professional technical programs

FAFSA Completion: \$100K to WSAC to partner with a non-profit in Tacoma for a comprehensive study on the feasibility and potential impacts on postsecondary enrollment of a policy of universal free application for FAFSA completion.

West Sound STEM Network:

\$250K to support increase STEM activities for students in school and after school and to develop industry education pathways in high demand sectors.

Child Care Access and Living Wage Proviso: \$533K to support an implementation plan to expand access to Washington's mixed delivery child care system.
